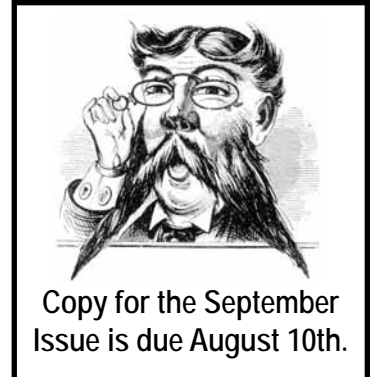

Tips for Raising Money-Smart Children

You try to raise your children right and teach them values, and while morals and ethics are important, it's important to be sure children learn about money and finances.

Here are some tips for parents to help their children learn about managing money.

Get them interested early. When your children are very young (age 3 or 4), show them how to tell different coins apart. Then give them a piggy bank to store up their change. Piggy banks are a tangible place to keep their money safe, and they can see, hear and feel how the bank fills up.

Make saving a habit. Make a house rule of saving a percentage of income, whether it is birthday money from relatives, earnings from a neighborhood lemonade stand, weekly allowance or a part-time job.

Open a savings account in a child's name. A KFS Kid's Club savings account can show kids how their money can earn money on its own -- through compound interest.

Give kids a compound interest table (available at all Kearny Federal Savings locations) to let them anticipate how their money can grow. Be sure to stop by your nearest KFS

Sturgeon Moon

The August full moon appears on Tuesday, August 28, 2007, at 10:35. It is called the "Full Sturgeon Moon."

According to "The Farmer's Almanac," the fishing tribes are given credit for the naming of this moon, since sturgeon, a large fish of the Great Lakes and other major bodies of water, were most readily caught during August.

A few tribes knew it as the "Full Red Moon" because, as the Moon rises, it appears reddish through any sultry haze. It was also called the "Green Corn Moon" or "Grain Moon."

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

Encourage goal setting. Have your kids write down their wish list, along with a deadline -- a skateboard by the end of the summer, a bike by next year. Visualizing may give kids the added motivation they need to save. You might also contribute a matching amount every time they reach a certain dollar amount in savings by themselves.

Give regular allowances. Allowances give children experience with real-life money matters, letting them practice how to save regularly and plan their spending. Of course, you should determine the amount of allowance that you think fits; for example, an amount equal to half their age per week.

Help plan a budget. Have kids write down what they'll buy during the week and how much each item costs. Then write down their weekly in-

come. If it doesn't add up, they'll have to prioritize their "needs" and their "wants."

Encourage money-earning ventures. To earn money beyond their weekly allowance, suggest that kids find creative ways to make money -- doing special household chores or seeking jobs in the neighborhood such as raking leaves, mowing lawns, pet sitting or shoveling snow.

Show children the effects of inflation. To show your kids how prices have gone up over the years, take them to the library to look up ads -- for movie tickets, bikes, sneakers -- in the newspaper archives.

Try finding the year they were born. Your kids can also use their math skills to see how much items they're saving for will cost in the future. For example, a bike that costs \$50 today might cost \$60 in five years, with 4 percent inflation. ###

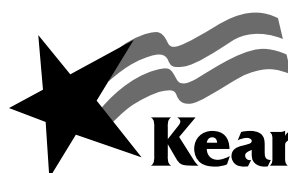

American Legion Keeps a 54 Year Old Promise

There is an old Brothers Grimm tale about a piper who was hired to rid a town of its many rats and after doing so was not paid for his services.

This story was one of the favorites of my children. Many times they would use the moral of the story to confront me whenever I changed my mind about some plans that we had made. I could hear them both sing out "...when you make a promise you don't break that promise."

What does the tale of "The Pied Piper of Hamelin" have to do with the James B. Scarr Post 106 of the American Legion? You be the judge!

In 1949, the American Legion Center of Hasbrouck Heights, Inc. bought a piece of land from the Borough for the sum of \$25.

The land was located at Henry Street and the Boulevard. The purpose was to build a Post Home. The Borough specified that the building must be built in five years. All parties agreed to this; however, the Legion had much difficulty in raising money for this project.

In 1953, the property of a former mayor of Hasbrouck Heights and a founding member of the Corporation was available.

The land, which already had a house on it, was located at Passaic and Terrace Avenues. The Corporation approached the Borough to amend their original agreement and let the Corporation sell the land they had and use the funds to purchase the new property. The land was sold for \$10,000 and the proceeds were applied to purchase the new property.

The agreement between the Borough and the Corporation was amended to read that the Corporation would pay the Borough \$10,000 if and whenever the property was sold. All parties of this agreement are no longer with us.

However, prior to selling their property this year, the Corporation reviewed and researched all records to discover their commitment to the Borough.

At a recent meeting of the Mayor and Council, Corporation President Michael Cahill presented a \$10,000 check to the Borough.

Never Missed A Call

On Thursday, June 28, the Community of Moonachie honored the 40 member Moonachie First Aid and Rescue Squad for never missing an emergency call in five years, their dependability and timely response. Receiving the plaque for the squad was 17 year veteran, Captain Frank Smith.

The Squad operates three trucks with an annual budget of \$13,000 and answers emergencies in the 1.75 square mile borough with fewer than 3,000 residents. They also assist

seven neighboring communities, averaging about 1,500 calls per year.

The Squad has three duty shifts and the headquarters is capable of housing volunteers overnight.

Each rig rolls out with four members and at least two ambulances are dispatched on every call.

Several volunteers are husband-wife and father-son teams.

On June 8, 2007, the Moonachie First Aid and Rescue

Squad held their bi-annual appreciation dinner at The Graycliff in Moonachie.

Rt. 17 Accident Injures Eight

On July 9, at about 2:17 p.m., the HHPD received calls of a multiple motor vehicle accident on Route 17 North.

Jr. Police Academy Recruit Class 8

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department held their 8th consecutive "Junior Police Academy" for Hasbrouck Heights students. About 29 students participated.

The one week program was held from June 26th through July 2nd from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The course was led by Jr. Police Academy civilian instructor, Michael Stillman, who teaches Community Policing Class at the Hasbrouck Heights High School and has led the Jr. Police Academy for 8 years.

Police Chief Michael Colaneri, Capt. John DeLorenzo, Lt. Shawn Mullins, Detective Sgt. Joseph Rinke, and Detective Michael Colaneri Jr. provided support during each session.

The first morning began with an orientation, "T" shirt and cap uniforms were issued, followed by drill.

A self-defense class was held at the Franklin School Gym, followed by team building activities.

The Bergen County K-9 Unit gave a demonstration with dogs trained to detect drugs and explosives, and the day concluded with more team building activities.

After Wednesday morning formation, the students viewed a motor vehicle stop video, and observed a vehicle felony stop demonstration with the proper procedures used to make a traffic stop in a patrol car.

That afternoon at police headquarters, the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) provided an overview of their activities and discussed some of the cases they had worked.

On Thursday morning, Sgt. Calabrese gave the students a tour of the old Bergen County jail and the Sheriff's Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) located at River Street in Hackensack.

This unit processes crime scenes for Bergen County police departments such as homicides, aggravated assaults, robberies and other serious felonies.

Detective Greg Beck discussed the careful processing of a crime scene to include photographing evidence, maintaining the chain of evidence, de-

tective interviews, canvassing, checking leads, etc. He stated that their goal is to be able to re-create a crime scene.

Det. Beck gave detailed background information on fingerprint identification, ballistics, and DNA. He explained the supporting role of the State Police lab in crime scene investigations.

Det. Beck reviewed recent Bergen County cases and how information gathered at the crime scene helped in apprehension of suspects.

The Bergen County Sheriff's Department issued the students special "dog tags."

That afternoon the Jr. Police Academy went to Teterboro Airport, first to the Port Authority Helicopter hangar where the crew gave an overview of their mission and how they assist law enforcement with infrared cameras and spotlights. The students were allowed to sit in one of the helicopters and operate the cameras.

They then went to view the Port Authority Police ARFF aircraft rescue and firefighting vehicle, which included the students operating the hoses and taking a ride.

On Friday, the students formed up at the HH Police Firing Range.

Sgt. John LaDuca and PO John Mongelli of the Bergen County Bomb Squad provided an exciting presentation about their activities to include equipment review, robot demonstrations and safe detonation of a very small bomb.

One of the students had the opportunity to put on a

bomb suit weighing over 100 pounds.

Coincidentally, this was the same day that London Police foiled car bomb threats.

The HHPD then reviewed details about the firing range, various targets, training, etc.

The class was introduced to the equipment HH police officers use, to include safety vests, batons, hand cuffs, etc.

Various weapons were exhibited and discussed, followed by a live fire demonstration of a shotgun and 9 mm duty weapon used by the HHPD.

That afternoon, a Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) agent gave the students an overview of the Bureau's mission and shared some interesting stories of their activities.

The final day's session on Monday began at Lincoln School with Iron Man exercises, Fatal Vision Goggle activities and drill followed by the Lyndhurst Police Depart-

ment SWAT Team surprising the students with a "flash bang" entrance, then demonstrated SWAT Team equipment and procedures.

On Monday evening, at 6:30 p.m., a graduation program was held in the High School auditorium.

It began with the HHPD Honor Guard. Chief Colaneri opened the ceremony with words of encouragement and congratulations.

A video of the week's activities produced by Matt Caruso and Krysten Sears was shown, followed by the awarding of Jr. Police Academy completion certificates. Graduates become members of the Junior Police Auxiliary.

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department offers this Jr. Police Academy to Hasbrouck Heights students at no cost. Those participating receive a "T" shirt and hat. The program is geared for 8th Graders going

into 9th Grade.

Previous graduates of the Jr. Police Academy assisted and received community service credit.

Graduates of the program assist the police department during Town Day, Fireworks Program, Bike Marathon and can help with the next class.

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department was one of the first communities to offer this program in Bergen County.

Detectives Scott Adamo and Michael Colaneri Jr. conceived the Jr. Police Academy program as a class project when they were attending the Bergen County Police Academy, and upon graduation, implemented the program in Hasbrouck Heights.

This successful program has expanded to offer an adult version, "Citizen's Police Academy: CSI Meets Law and Order," which held their 2nd class in April/May 2006. ###

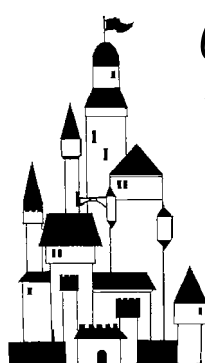

Police Department Fingerprints 2nd Graders

Since the 1970's, the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department has conducted the "Project Kid Care ID Program" for all Corpus Christi, Euclid and Lincoln School 2nd Graders beginning in April and ending in June. About 150+ students participated this year.

Each Kid Care Photo ID Kit includes a standardized head-and-shoulders ID photo, fingerprints, child's vital statis-

tics, valuable emergency information, and the rules of safety. The kit also includes two wallet IDs. These photo IDs are used for missing children.

This year, the kits were prepared digitally.

Det. Sgt. Joseph Rinke emphasized, "Kits are kept by the family. **The digital photo and fingerprints are purged after the session and are not saved on the system.** If the

ID is lost, the process must be repeated."

This is the first year that the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department prepared the kits electronically, using their new "Livescan" fingerprinting system and a digital camera.

Once the child was fingerprinted and photographed, the kit was assembled on a computer and a color printout was

made for the family.

Captain John DeLorenzo said, "This digital system is cleaner than the inked fingerprints. Sometimes fingerprinting a fidgeting youngster was difficult. With this new digital ID program, the quality of each fingerprint is validated immediately."

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department acquired an automatic "Livescan" finger-

print system this year.

The main console is located in the Police Department. A portable kit allows the Department to go to schools to conduct the child safety ID program.

Both the console and mobile unit cost \$25,000 (\$20,000 came from confiscated drug funds and \$5,000 was donated by an anonymous Hasbrouck Heights resident). ###

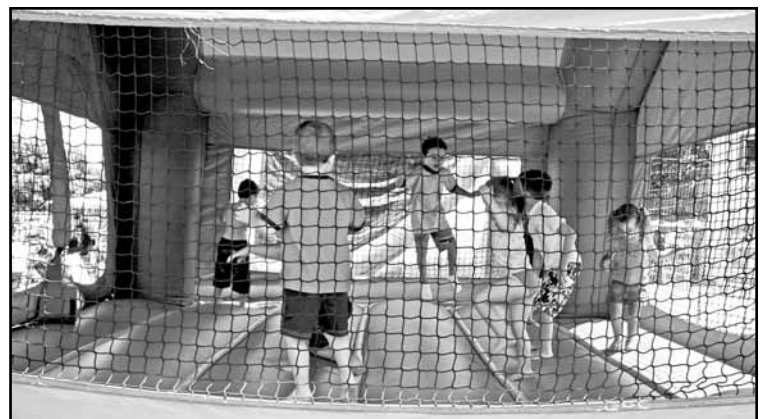

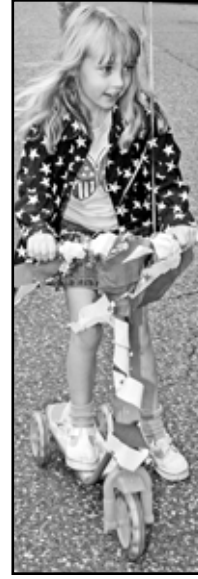
During the course of the evening, prizes were raffled off to lucky participants. Among

Rider Recognized

During the Aviation Hall of Fame and Museum of New Jersey at Teterboro's Annual Induction Dinner on May 23, 2007, the Fred L. Wehran Aviation Achievement Award was presented by Carol Wehran Greene to Lanny Rider, Manager of Teterboro Airport.

The following was her introduction:

"Lanny Rider, a native of Oregon, joined the US Army in 1966. Two years later, he was enrolled in flight school for helicopter pilot training. In 1969 he was sent to Vietnam, and returned a decorated Veteran. For 20 years, he served as a Commissioned Army Aviator. Today, Lanny holds a commercial pilot's certificate and has over 3,000 hours of flight time to his credit.

After active service, Lanny's love of flight brought him to Troy State University in Alabama, where he earned a Bachelor's Degree in Aviation Operations Management. Since Lanny joined the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey in 1977, he has served in a variety of positions involving all facets of airport and heliport operations. He has been manager of the Aeronautical Services Division at JFK, and manager of the Security and Services Division at La Guardia.

Teterboro Airport has the distinction of being home to the Port Authority's first Helicopter and Heliports Division. In 1987, Lanny Rider was transferred to Teterboro and put in charge of this Division, which to this day, is still housed in Hangar 121-B.

In February, 2001, following the retirement of Philip Engle, Lanny was asked to return to Teterboro with expanded duties as Airport Manager. In part, his success is due to his ability to work with other people, and to facilitate team building, networking, relationships, and common goals and solutions. Lanny himself

attributes these valuable skills to growing up in Oregon on a farm, in a small town where people had to work together.

Do I see some direct parallels between Lanny Rider and my Dad, Fred Wehran! Both were farm boys, both served their country with military distinction, and both loved helicopters. However, Lanny is a formally educated airport manager, and Dad was self-taught.

Lanny, you'd probably be amused to see these books I brought from Dad's library:

- Airport Planning, © 1944
- Airport Design, Construction and Maintenance, © 1945
- Shell Oil's Refueling the Airplane, © 1944
- Airport Planning, © 1946

Yet the principles contained in these books were a beginning, which the Port Authority and Lanny Rider have carried forward with far-reaching plans. It could be said that in Lanny's six years as airport manager, he has re-built Teterboro.

Additionally, he has been a strong supporter of the Aviation Hall of Fame and Museum, for which we are most grateful.

Congratulations, Lanny, it's a pleasure and a privilege to present this award to you on behalf of the AHOF and Museum of NJ. I'm sure your professional expertise will be greatly missed by the Port Authority, but don't be a stranger to the Museum. You'll always be welcome here." ###

Lanny's Legacy

Lanny Rider has retired from an illustrious career in aviation. Lanny was the first Port Authority Airport Manager of Teterboro in more than 30 years.

Under Lanny's direction, Teterboro Airport has grown into one of the nation's premier general aviation airports.

Most recently, he established the Teterboro Airport Industry Working Group, an unprecedented organization of Aviation Industry professionals who are striving together to resolve some of the sensitive community issues at Teterboro.

He fostered the Teterboro Users Group (TUG), a proactive aviation organization dedicated to improving Teterboro Airport.

Working with the Port Authority's Capital Improvement Program, Lanny has overseen extensive airfield construction to include the installation of the arrestor bed at the north end of Runway 6 near Route 46, storm water drainage with the 6 million dollar funding of the new Teterboro pumping station which will significantly reduce flooding problems in the Borough of Teterboro and surrounding municipalities.

He has laid the ground work for the relocation of Redneck Road in Moonachie and the installation of an arrestor bed at the south end of Runway 19.

He has helped orchestrate large-scale tenant reconstruction, and many improvements

in safety and security at the airport; such as the new perimeter fencing, improved taxiways, etc., as well as improving the appearance of the airport with new signage and landscaping improvements at the northeast and northwest corners of the perimeter.

Additionally, he developed plans for the relocation of the Port Authority administration and maintenance facilities,

He has focused much of his attention to developing a strong commitment to Teterboro's community relations.

He helped facilitate the use of airport property for local communities with the creation of the Wright Brothers Memorial Soccer Field at Industrial and Moonachie Avenue, and provided the land for a Moonachie DPW facility on Industrial Avenue.

He has had discussions with the Meadowlands Commission about creating a nature walk on the eastern side of the airport.

On behalf of the Port Authority, he has generously supported the area's fire services with the \$50,000 donation for a new Moonachie Fire Truck, an ARFF vehicle to the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department, etc.

He has helped promote community relations with TANAAC, Teterboro Business League & Meadowlands Regional Chamber of Commerce,

etc. Under his stewardship, the airport continues to work with many nonprofit organizations to support fund-raising events, local baseball and softball leagues, family day and career days at the airport. They host the annual 5K "Runway Run" to benefit the Bergen County United Way and support the annual Wings & Wheels Expo. The airport community also sponsors an annual golf tournament that provides scholarships to local high school students.

He is an avid supporter of "Angel Flights NE," a nonprofit organization providing free flights in private aircraft with volunteer pilots for those in need to access medical care or other compelling needs.

He represented the Port Authority in working closely with elected officials, concerned citizens and the Environmental and Occupational Health Sciences Institute at Rutgers University to conduct and evaluate the air quality in the area launching environmental studies.

He initiated studies to review ways for airport operations to become more eco-friendly.

With Teterboro Airport generating \$500 million annually to the local economy, he has strongly supported the Port Authority's ASDO initiative supporting local businesses. ###

Lanny's Final Farewell Message



During Lanny Rider's retirement dinner held at the Fiesta on Thursday, June 28, 2007, many local government, airport and Port Authority officials publicly recognized Lanny's contributions.

Mr. Rider offered these thoughts: "I look out at all my friends and the support I have had over the last six years and it's like family."

To illustrate his point, he asked, "(Port Authority *TEB Aviation*) Julio, Pat, EJ, Paul, Ed and Rich, please stand up.

My FAA friends Larry and Cat, please stand up.

Falcon Jet, TUG and all of our FBO's -- Meridian, Signature, Jet Aviation, First Aviation, and Atlantic Aviation, please stand up.

AvPORTS, John Panarello and all of your staff, Port Authority construction Ralph, Cathy and all of your staff, AIG, Rich from customs at Teterboro for years, please stand up.

Sue Baer and Bill DeCota (*PA Aviation*) and all of my community friends, all of our elected representatives, Kevin from the Civil Air Patrol who have helped me immensely on many occasions, all of my friends from the AHOF Museum, and the aviation associations NBAA and AOPA, and my wife and my son, please stand up.

Now if you want to look around the room -- that's Teterboro Airport. That is everything we have accomplished over the last six years.

Every one of you has been involved in helping me and supporting me and I would like you all to give yourselves a hand.

When I was lucky enough to be asked to come to Teterboro six years ago, I came with joy in my heart and not having a clue of what I was getting myself into.

I walked into the door over there and the first big thing that happened to us was 9-11 and it has basically been a roller coaster ever since.

We have had some really great times and some tough

times to go through.

But working together, all of this group that was standing up here, we did it together and we did rebuild this airport

We took this airport and turned it into the premier general aviation airport in this country.

We've set a tone, and I want you to carry it ahead. As I retire, the course is set. We've got the relationships. We know what we need to do. All we need to do is to carry it forward. We are well on the way. It's only going to get better. We've got to carry on, be thoughtful of each other, work with each other and support each other as a team.

And working with our communities, our neighbors, are really going to have the best airport in this country and the best relationships in this country as well. So I thank you for all of your support.

I need to say a few things about the Port Authority. Obviously, it has been my whole career. I love the Port Authority. The Port Authority has been a wonderful organization.

I was in the Army for about 10 years on active service before I joined the Port Authority. It was a dramatic change for me to leave the Army.

When I came on board with the Port Authority, I really found another family and home and the Port has supported me for 30 years.

My upbringing was that you get a day's pay for a day's work. The Port always came through on their end, and I hope I came through on my end of that deal.

I will tell one quick story about coming to the Port.

When I left the Army, I received my degree in the mid-70's and we were in the middle of a recession.

I sent out about a 100 resumes, maybe more, to every aviation company I could find.

I received two requests for interviews. I did get a number of offers to join various training programs to be a flight engineer; all I had to do was pay them \$10,000 which I did not have at the time.

Of the two interview offers, one was a little start up Tennessee freight job and the other was the Port Authority.

The Port offered to fly me to New York and put me into a hotel (*I was in Alabama at the time*); I would go through a two day interview process and they would fly me back home.

I had never been to New York and at the time thought it was a great opportunity to see it. I heard that the PA ran the largest airport system in

the world. When it came to airports and airplanes, the Port had been in the business since 1947 and there wasn't a better organization around.

I went on the interview and I was totally blown away. Of course, the first day anybody comes to New York, they spend that day looking up at all of those buildings and it takes two days to get the crick out of your neck.

What an elaborate interview system, with these two-three-four person panels I had to talk with -- some of the most distinguished aviation managers in the country.

They had us in rooms with one way mirrors and microphones.

I went through that whole process and flew back home. I walked through the door and there was a telephone call waiting for me. I was asked if I would like to join the Port Authority. I jumped on that opportunity and was working up here in a month.

The other little interview I didn't go to, the little one-horse cargo outfit in Memphis, Tennessee -- that was a little outfit called Federal Express. I hear that everybody that joined back in those days in the 70's got stock options that split about for times. They are all retired rich.

I think that I am rich as well. I have had the opportunity to work in an industry that I love.

I am one of those lucky people that have gotten to do my entire life in what I wanted to do, and that was working in aviation, fly airplanes, fly helicopters and be around these wonderful people in an industry that has probably had as big of an impact on our civilization as anything -- maybe up to the internet. It has made the world small.

But you never slack off in this business. You never take anything for granted. You always have to be on your game.

And everybody in this room -- just look around at yourselves -- and everybody is on your game.

It has been a fun ride for 30 years and I have really enjoyed it. I just want to say that I thank you all for your help and support and we've had a really great run here at Teterboro.

I wish you all the very, very best and I know that you are all going to carry this on -- the way we got it started. Thank you." ###

History Visits Teterboro

The legendary "Lost Squadron" P-38 Lightning "Glacier Girl" was at Jet Aviation on June 21 and 22, bound for Duxford, England to complete her historic World War II trans-Atlantic mission. The plane was not available for public viewing.

On the evening of June 21st, trustees of the Aviation Hall of Fame enjoyed a private briefing by "Glacier Girl" Project Manager, Bob Cardin.

Mr. Cardin, who has been involved with the whole project, provided incredible behind the scenes insight from the crash landing of the lost squadron (six P-38's and two B-17's) on a Greenland ice cap, July 15, 1942, the rescue operation, their discovery and salvage operation in 1992, and restoration.

Following the presentation, AHOF trustees had a private viewing of "Glacier Girl" and P-51 "Miss Velma" in the Jet Aviation hangar.

On the following morning

there was a press conference, interviews with one of the Lost Squadron pilots, 89-year-old Brad McManus, and current pilot, Steve Hinton, followed by photo opportunities in the hangar and departure from Teterboro Airport.

The Lost Squadron was part of a daring plan called Operation Bolero that eventually brought hundreds of U.S. fighters and bombers to England via Canada, Greenland and Iceland as a faster alternative to having planes disassembled and shipped to England in convoys that were targets of U-boat attacks.

The route was chosen because the planes lacked the navigational and communications equipment to make a direct trans-Atlantic flight on their own.

The Lost Squadron did not make it because of foul weather which forced them to crash land on a glacier in Greenland. The crews were spotted by air and rescued by dogsled after 10

days, but the planes were left behind. Decades of snow and ice covered the plane's.

The planes general location was discovered in 1983. In the spring of 1992, an expedition found and salvaged the squadron under 268 feet of ice. "Glacier Girl" was selected for extrication because it had the least damage from the weight and movement of the ice and most salvageable.

The salvage team melted their way down using steam hoses, disassembled (as it was originally assembled) the P-38 in the hole and took it up piece by piece.

A recovery and restoration mission took more than ten years and more than a million dollars to return this aircraft to her original flying glory.

On June 22, 2007, Pilot Steve Hinton began retracing "Glacier Girl's" original path, alongside a vintage WWII P-51 Mustang, to complete The Lost Squadron's mission in Operation Bolero II. ###

Jet Aviation Hosts ‘Liberty Belle’ WWII B-17

“Liberty Belle,” a newly restored World War II B-17 Bomber, took to Teterboro’s skies on July 19-22.

Many area residents had the opportunity to view the “Liberty Belle” up close, and to take a ride in this ultimate historical experience -- to touch the past and fly through ageless skies.

The “Liberty Belle” provided visitors the opportunity to take a step back in time and gain respect for the men and women who gave so much to protect our freedoms.

During the flight, passengers enjoyed the unique opportunity of moving about the aircraft to the different combat crew positions to see the viewpoint that thousands of our heroes saw in combat over 60 years ago.

“Liberty Belle” is one of only 14 B-17’s that still fly today. The B-17, dubbed the “Flying Fortress” as a result of her defensive fire power, saw action in every theater of operation during WWII.

There were 12,732 B-17’s produced between 1935 and 1945; of these 4,735 were lost in combat. Following WWII, the B-17 saw combat in three more wars: Korea, Israel (*used in the war of 1948*), and Vietnam.

“Liberty Belle” was built toward the end of the war and never saw combat. It is painted in the colors and nose art of the original “Liberty Belle” B-17 that flew countless missions with the 390th Bomb Group of the mighty 8th Air Force.

The Liberty Foundation’s

B-17G had an interesting post-war history. It was sold for scrap in 1947 to a mining company, then sold again to Pratt & Whitney for the sum of \$2,700.00.

In 1968, the B-17 was then donated to the Connecticut Aeronautical Historic Society. Unfortunately, in 1979 the B-17 was heavily damaged in a tornado that threw another airplane onto the B-17’s mid-section, breaking her back.

The wreck was stored until 1987 when acquired by an aviation enthusiast in Florida with the intent to restore the aircraft.

In 1992, the slow, laborious task of restoration began. The turn of the century saw the B-17 sold again to Don Brooks of the Liberty Foundation.

Mr. Brooks, whose father flew B-17’s with the 390th Bomb Group during WWII, founded the Liberty Foundation; a non-profit museum dedicated to preserving our aviation heritage, and funded the complete restoration of the B-17 back to her full wartime configuration.

He chose to paint the B-17 as the “Liberty Belle,” a tribute to his father who was a tail gunner and flew numerous combat missions in the original “Liberty Belle,” and all the brave aircrew of WWII. The B-17 took to the skies again after 38 years, on December 8, 2004.

The system will only respond to touchtone telephones

or through a TTY, a device for the deaf and hard of hearing.

The Wellness Check Program is part of a coordinated system of health and human services for older adults and individuals with disabilities over the age of 18, called Bergen NJ Ease.

NJ Ease provides information on a wide variety of community-based services and programs sponsored by the Divisions of Senior Services and Disability Services.

Applications are available at the Hasbrouck Heights Health Department. Forward the completed application to the address specified on the form. You will receive a phone call prior to your first call to let you know your application has been processed.

“Hot Tips” From Heights Fire Dept. EMS

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department EMS offers these suggestions regarding summer heat:

If you must be out in the heat:

- Limit your outdoor activity to morning and evening hours.
- Do not engage in strenuous activities. Cut down on exercise. If you must work/exercise, drink two to four glasses of cool fluids each hour. A sports beverage can replace the salt and minerals you lose in sweat. **Warning:** If you are on a low-salt diet, talk with your doctor before drinking a sports beverage.
- Try to rest often in shady areas.
- Wear lightweight clothing.
- Protect yourself from the sun by wearing a wide-brimmed hat (*also keeps you cooler*) and sunglasses and by putting on sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher (*the most effective*

products say “broad spectrum” or “UVA/UVB protection” on their labels).

Senior Care

Visit adults at risk at least twice a day and closely watch them for signs of heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

People 65 years and older are more prone to heat stress than younger people for several reasons:

Older adults do not adjust as well as young people to sudden changes in temperature.

They are more likely to have a chronic medical condition that upsets normal body responses to heat.

They are more likely to

take prescription medicines that impair the body's ability to regulate its temperature or that inhibit perspiration.

Sunburn First Aid

Avoid repeated sun exposure. Apply cold compresses or immerse the sunburned area in cool water. Apply moisturizing lotion to affected areas. Do not use salve, butter or ointment. Do not break blisters.

Heat Rash First Aid

Keep the affected area dry. Dusting powder may be used to increase comfort but avoid using ointments or creams as they keep the skin warm and moist and may make the condition worse. ###

Summer Heat is on the Way!

As I forecasted in last month's edition of **The Gazette**, frequent bouts of heavy to severe thunderstorms and near or slightly cooler than normal temperatures were expected for most of the month of July.

In fact, the first few weeks of July, indeed, turned out wetter than normal and had hardly any days with really hot weather!

Sure, there were a few hot ones, but not many. Rainfall for the month was in the 5" to 6" range and high temperatures were generally in the low 80's.

We normally see about 4 and 3/4" of rain and high temperatures of around 85 in the month of July.

One of our more severe thunderstorms that marched through Hasbrouck Heights/Teterboro area was on the morning of July 18. Crashing thunder and torrential rain accompanied that thunderstorm.

There was over 1 1/2" of rain here in Hasbrouck Heights in only 1 hour's time! This produced flash flooding in the "usual suspect" areas such as the lower spots on Route 17, etc.

That same thunderstorm moved onto Long Island and produced an EF1 tornado in Islip! The "EF" scale is the revised "Fujita" tornado scale.

"E" means enhanced... since the scale was revised over the past year or so. Anyway, the scale is from 0 to 5, 0 being the weakest on the scale. An EF1 tornado is fairly strong and was strong enough to take off some roofs in Islip as the winds were up to 111 to 135 mph (which defines the EF1).

I am forecasting less frequent severe thunderstorms (there will be several strong thunderstorms but not as many as we have seen in the month of July) for the month of August with a significant warming!

That means, get the air conditioner ready; a good chunk of August will be hot.

Temperatures by day will

frequently top out over 90 with a few days reaching 95 to 100. The "good ol'" dog days of summer will be upon us.

In my research, I found peace and meaning in my life's experiences just by understanding these Bible quotes.

The understanding I share here is gathered from my life's exposure to others who have searched for clarification. I thank these fellow seekers who help me find hidden spiritual treasures in the Bible.

Changing Thoughts

Matt. 3: 2 "And saying, Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

"Repent" comes from the word metanoia, to change your way of thinking. "Kingdom of heaven is at hand," does not mean that your death is at hand or any time soon. Change your way of thinking, change your attitude, and be set free of ideas of poverty, sickness, revenge, impatience and you can "at hand" [NOW] have heavenly peace, bliss, freedom and express love-kindness instead of negativity.

Teachable

Matt. 5: 5 "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth."

"Meek" does not mean, fawning, shy, or head tilted down. Meek means teachable.

Those that are hard headed combatants or competitors do not last long at their jobs as they are afraid of losing their high positions. This type of personality causes great resentment or friction at their jobs.

Jesus is showing us that we must give up our attachment to what we think we own or value. Did you ever wonder about people in tornado zones or hurricane disasters?

Notice on the TV interviews with such people many have a wonderful attitude about how grateful they are for being alive and willingness to start over again. There are those who are so attached to what they owned that they lost all hope because of their loss.

I guess it's all about what we cherish. How would we each respond?

Gratitude

Mark 4: 25 "For he that hath, to him shall be given: and to he that has not, from him shall be taken even that which he hath."

To the one who feels he has, comes gratitude. He has no feeling of having to acquire in order to be complete, accomplished, or recognized.

When this individual re-

ceives something, he has a feeling that something not sought after was given to him beyond what he feels is needed or expected.

To the one who feels he has not, comes envy, desiring and a desperate need to acquire -- to show he possesses and therefore earthly successful.

This type of consciousness will travel twenty miles out of the way to save five dollars on a \$150.00 item.

If this person is over-charged at a check-out counter for 25 cents on an item they will feel that the store is trying to take from them. This is only an innocent computer mistake.

This negative, pauper consciousness can develop into a thief, cheat, or worse because they will never have enough.

Reason to Forgive

Luke 6:37 "Judge not, and ye shall not be judged: condemn not, and ye shall not be condemned: forgive, and ye shall be forgiven:"

You cannot do anything unless it is in your consciousness first.

When we learn to be forgiving, we are for loving. If we cannot forgive others easily we also feel very fawning and responsible if we make an error. We then have become self-judging. As long as we wonder "How am I doing?" we will also judge others.

When we learn not to take experiences personally and we realize we are spiritual beings, we will no longer need to even forgive, because we are not capable of being offended.

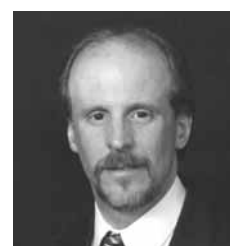
